Activities to do during Summer to be handed in for September:

Activity/task - First, research a crime that is underreported in the UK (e.g. domestic violence, hate crime) Plan and design a campaign poster to raise awareness of this crime amongst the general public. You could include; a name for your campaign, a slogan/logo, an information poster/leaflet including images and statistics.

How this links to your course - *Unit 1: Changing awareness of crime.* A significant part of this Unit requires you to plan (e.g. thinking about target audience, finances, methods and materials, timescales) your own campaign for change. You need to design and create this campaign (e.g. produce a leaflet/poster, design a t-shirt or hoodie).

Activity/task - Research biological theories - Lombroso or Sheldon - why people commit crime

How this links to your course - Unit 2: Criminological Theories.

Unit 2 is all about looking at a range of theories that try to explain why people commit crime. We then evaluate these theories by looking at their strengths and weaknesses. Produce a mind map or drawing to showing understanding of the theory.
